Launches November 14

Calling for a new way of thinking, feeling, understanding and living

Catholic organizations are invited to join the *Laudato Si'* initiative during what Cardinal Turkson calls **"this crucial decade" for "radical societal transformation"** as increasing climate change and environmental degradation threaten both the planet's ecosystems and people.

Nov. 14 is the launch of the Laudato Si' Action Platform and is also the World Day of the Poor, which Francis established in November 2016. The launch is following a major U.N. climate conference, COP26 in Glasgow, Scotland (Nov. 1-12).

Autumn has spoken to world leaders, been honoured by the Assembly of First Nations, was the Keynote speaker at the United Nations World Water Day, traveled the world to raise awareness, and has been nominated for the prestigious International Children's Peace Prize in 2017, 2018 and 2019, as well as being named a "Science Defender" by the Union of Concerned Scientists in 2019.




Book of the month
