

In Memory of Fr. Laurent Gallant, OFM

On March 5, 2018, Fr. Laurent Gallant died at the Carrefour Providence in Montreal at the age of 86 years. Sixty-six (66) of these years had been spent in religious life with fifty-eight (58) as a priest.

Over the years, St. Francis of Assisi Fraternity had many connections with Fr. Laurent. During his regular visits to the Island, he always took time to make contact with our fraternity. He facilitated one of the fraternity's annual retreats as well as a retreat for members in Newfoundland. He also conducted the most recent pastoral visit to our fraternity.



Fr. Laurent was born on December 24, 1931 in Piusville, PEI, son of Antoine Gallant and Marie-Ida Arsenault. He began his early education in Piusville and, in 1944, he went on to l'Université Saint-Joseph de Moncton in New Brunswick (note that he would have only been 13 when he left home to begin his studies off-Island). He entered the novitiate of the Franciscans in 1951 and was solemnly professed in 1955. He went on to study philosophy and theology in Quebec, and to obtain a higher education in France where he studied in Strasbourg, Lyon and Paris; in 1978, he obtained his Doctorate in Religious Sciences and Sacramental Theology from the Catholic Institute of Paris; his theses was on "The Little Office of the Passion of St. Francis of Assisi".

Over the years, Fr. Laurent worked as both a professor and director of liturgy in various institutions within Canada and abroad. He also participated in numerous committees supporting the formation and study of friars, including being director of novices within his Province. For over 10 years, he was responsible for developing and leading the organization tasked with animating the life of the Franciscan Family in Quebec (SIAF). He also led and participated in the organization of pilgrimages associated with *Expérience d'Assise*, and was a regular participant in international congresses on medieval studies.

In 2014, he was elected on the Definitory Council of the Province of St. Joseph and, since 2015, had been the Director of the Province's Library.

Fr. Laurent was a remarkable Franciscan, both a scholar and humble brother, who made an outstanding contribution to his community, to the Church and to society at large. He will be greatly missed within the Franciscan Family. May his soul rest in peace.

Our Lord Jesus Christ says: "You are salt for the earth. But if salt loses its taste, what can make it salty again? It is no longer good for anything, except to be thrown out and trampled underfoot. In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven. You are light for the world. A city built on a hilltop cannot be hidden."

Reflection on St. Clare of Assisi

St. Clare was born in Assisi in 1194. Her mother was inspired to call her Clare (meaning light) as she received these words while in prayer before her birth "you will give birth to a light which will give light more clearly than light itself". Clare's faith was very important to her even as a young child. However, her decision to leave her home forever to follow Francis was no less dramatic than his conversion experience. For a woman to completely embrace a life of poverty was unheard of in the history of the Church and was a source of great consternation for the hierarchy of the Church.

The houses of the nobility in Assisi at the time of Francis and Clare had a door known as the "Door of the dead". It was only used when the dead body of a family member was removed from the house, never to return. Clare escaped from her father's house through the "Door of the dead" on the Palm Sunday night she left to join Francis and his brothers. In that moment, she let her old life of nobility die to join Francis in this new way of life.

Questions for reflection:

- Jon Sweeney says in the St. Clare Prayer Book (p.20) that Clare was the well to Francis' river. Although her way of living was true to the spirit of Francis, her way deepened it in various new directions. What does this mean for me as a Secular Franciscan?
- How has following in the footsteps of St. Clare inspired and influenced me?

If anyone is interested in representing the fraternity at either of these events, please let a member of the fraternity council know that you are interested. Car pooling will likely be available to facilitate travelling



Women at the Heart of Peace (Part 3) Prayer of the Mothers

In the fall of 2017, thousands of Israeli and Palestinian women of the Women Wage Peace movement organized a 2-week march for peace through parts of Israel and the West Bank. It ended with a rally in Jerusalem.

Sunday's arrival in Jerusalem coincided with the week-long Jewish holiday of Sukkot, which commemorates the Jewish journey through the Sinai after their exodus from Egypt.

In 2015, Women Wage Peace members fasted in relays over 50 days, the length of the 2014 war between Israel and the Hamas terror group in the Gaza Strip.

Israeli and Palestinian activists were ending a two-week march Sunday through parts of Israel and the West Bank with a Jerusalem rally to demand a peace deal.

The Women Wage Peace movement organized the march, which began on September 24 and includes participants who have themselves been affected by violence in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.
