Living Out the Incarnation

The Incarnation of Jesus forms the basis of our Christian faith and the actions of Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation (JPIC) form our decisive participation in this mystery. During this time of Advent, we reflect on how Secular Franciscans can use their active faith to make Christ present in the world.

From Article 15 of our Rule: Let them individually and collectively be in the forefront in promoting justice by the testimony of their human lives and their courageous initiatives.



Since Vatican II, an important role of laity has been the task of ministry. No longer are the laity charged with just the threefold adage of "pray, pay, and obey". The lay person has become the most effective evangelizer for the Church. This role of ministry for laity is not just about doing "churchy" things like proclaiming the Word as a lector, serving as an extraordinary minister of the Eucharist, or teaching catechetics, as important as these may be. It is a more dominant, outfront role of saturating the secular milieu with the message of the Lord. The laity's pulpit becomes the platform of politics and business, family life and social issues. Almost 60 years later, the words of the Vatican II document on the Church in the modern world (# 43) still ring true: "One of the gravest errors of our time is the dichotomy between the faith which many profess and the practice of it in their daily lives."

- What justice am I showing to those living around me?
- What am I doing to assist the settlement of refugees or minorities in my area?
- How am I involved in securing fair assistance for those in need in my community?
- Do I use my voting power and my correspondence with legislators to shape domestic and foreign policy with principles of Christian justice?

Let us use the season of Advent to think of ways in which we can activate our faith to fulfill the meaning of Christmas.

Condolences





ADDRESS OF THE HOLY FATHER FRANCIS TO PARTICIPANTS IN THE GENERAL CHAPTER OF THE SECULAR FRANCISCAN ORDER

Sala Clementina Monday, November 15, 2021

Dear brothers and sisters of the Secular Franciscan Order, good morning!

I greet you with the words that St. Francis addressed to those he met along the way: " *May the Lord give you peace!* ". I am happy to welcome you on the occasion of your General Chapter. In this context I would like to recall some elements proper to your vocation and mission.

Your vocation arises from the universal call to holiness. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* reminds us that "the laity participate in the priesthood of Christ: ever more united with him, they unfold the grace of Baptism and Confirmation in all the dimensions of personal, family, social and ecclesial life, and thus fulfill the call to holiness addressed to all the baptized "(n. 941).

This holiness, to which you are called as Secular Franciscans, as the General Constitutions and the Rule approved by St. Paul VI ask of you, involves the conversion of the heart, attracted, conquered and transformed by the One who is the *only Saint*, who is "the good, all good, the highest good "(St. Francis, *Praise of God Most High*). This is what makes you true "penitents". In his *Letter to all the faithful*, St. Francis presents "doing penance" as a path of conversion, a path of Christian life, a commitment to do the will and works of the heavenly Father. In the *Testament*, then, he describes his own conversion process with these words, which you know well: "The Lord gave me, Brother Francis, to begin to do penance like this: when I was in sin, it seemed too bitter to see the lepers; and the Lord Himself brought me among them and I showed mercy with them. And as I moved away from them, what seemed bitter to me was changed into sweetness of soul and body. And then I stayed a little and left the world "(1-3).

The conversion process is like this: God takes the initiative: "The Lord gave me to begin to do penance". God leads the penitent to places where he would never have wanted to go: "God led me among them, the lepers". The penitent responds by accepting to place himself at the service of others and using mercy with them. And the result is happiness: "What seemed bitter to me was changed into sweetness of mind and body". Just the path of conversion of Francis.

This, dear brothers and sisters, is what I urge you to accomplish in your life and in your mission. And please don't confuse "doing penance" with "works of penance". These - fasting, almsgiving, mortification - are consequences of the decision to open your heart to God. Open your heart to Christ, living in the midst of ordinary people, in the style of St. Francis. As Francis was a "mirror of Christ", so may you too become "mirrors of Christ".

You are men and women committed to living in the world according to the Franciscan charism. A charism that essentially consists in *observing the holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ*. The vocation of the Secular Franciscan is to live the Gospel in the world in the style of the Poverello, *sine glossa*; to assume the Gospel as a "form and rule" of life. I urge you to embrace the Gospel as if by embracing Jesus. May it be the Gospel, that is, Jesus himself, that shapes your life. Thus you will assume poverty, minority, simplicity as your distinctive signs in front of everyone.

With this Franciscan and secular identity of yours, you are part of the outgoing Church. Your favorite place is to be among the people, and there, as lay people - celibate or married -, priests and bishops, each according to their specific vocation, give witness to Jesus with a simple life, without pretensions, always happy to follow Christ poor and crucified, as did St. Francis and so many men and women of your Order. I also encourage you to go out to the peripheries, the existential peripheries of today, and there to let the word of the Gospel resound. Do not forget the poor, who are the flesh of Christ: you are called to announce the Good News to them (*cf.Lk*4.18), as did St. Elizabeth of Hungary, your patroness, among others. And as yesterday the "fraternities of penitents" were characterized by founding hospitals, dispensaries, soup kitchens and other works of concrete social charity, so today the Spirit sends you to exercise the same charity with the creativity required by the new forms of poverty.

May your secularity be full of closeness, compassion, tenderness. And may you be men and women of hope, committed to living it and also "organizing" it, translating it into concrete everyday situations, into human relationships, into social and political commitment; nurturing hope in tomorrow by alleviating today's pain.

And all this, dear brothers and sisters, you are called to live in fraternity, feeling part of the great Franciscan family. In this sense, I remind you of Francis' desire that the whole family remain united, certainly respecting the diversity and autonomy of the various components and also of each member. But always in a vital reciprocal communion, to dream together of a world in which all are and feel brothers, and struggling together to build it (cf. Enc. *Brothers all*, 8): men and women who fight for justice, and who work for an integral ecology, collaborating in missionary projects and making you peacemakers and witnesses of the Beatitudes.

So we began with the way of conversion, and then all these proposals of fruitfulness, which come from the heart united to the Lord and a lover of poverty. May St. Francis and all the saints of the Franciscan family accompany you on your journey. May the Lord bless you and Our Lady, "Virgin made Church", keep you. And please don't forget to pray for me. Thanks.
